


Minnesotans' views of President Trump

Findings from the MPR News | Star Tribune Minnesota Poll

September 21, 2018

A plurality of Minnesota voters want their midterm vote to change the direction President Trump is leading the nation

Key findings

Results from the September 2018 MPR News | Star Tribune Minnesota Poll of 800 likely voters show:

- While President Trump is not on the ballot in the November 2018 midterm elections, a
 plurality of Minnesota voters (43%) want their vote to change the direction President
 Trump is leading the nation.
 - A majority of voters age 18 to 34, women below age 50, and voters residing in Hennepin and Ramsey counties indicate agreement with the statement, "I want my vote in November to *change* the direction President Trump is leading the nation."
 - Over 80 percent of those identifying as Democrats, as well as those who voted for Hillary Clinton in the 2016 presidential election, indicated a preference for changing the direction in which Trump is leading.
 - Three-quarters of Republicans and two-thirds of 2016 Trump voters indicate agreement with the statement "I want my vote in November to *support* the direction President Trump is leading the nation."
 - One-quarter of Republicans and nearly one-third of Trump voters indicate that "my vote this November doesn't have much to do with President Trump and his policies."
 - Among independents, 1 in 5 intends to support Trump's leadership through their voting in November, while 2 in 5 want their votes to change the nation's direction, and another 2 in 5 are not considering Trump in their voting decisions.
 - Looking at the specific vote preferences for Minnesota's statewide seats in the upcoming midterms – Governor, Attorney General, and both U.S. Senate seats – a strong majority of those favoring Republican candidates are voting to support Trump's leadership, while the reverse is true for those supporting DFL candidates.
 - Voters who are undecided in the upcoming statewide races are mixed:
 - In the governor and attorney general races, fewer undecided voters are looking to support Trump's leadership than either opposing his leadership or setting Trump's leadership aside in their considerations.
 - In the Smith versus Housley Senate race, undecided voters are statistically tied between supporting and opposing Trump's leadership.
 - In the Klobuchar versus Newberger Senate race, the smaller number of undecided voters tend to either support Trump's leadership or are not considering Trump in their voting preferences.

- Voters are split on President Trump's job performance on the economy, but a majority rate him negatively on truthfulness, favorability, and characterization of the press.
 - A strong majority of President Trump's base 95 percent of Republicans and 86 percent of those who voted for him in 2016 approve of Trump's overall performance as president.
 - A majority of men over age 50 approve of the President's overall job performance.
 - A significantly higher proportion disapprove than approve of Trump's overall job performance among these groups of likely voters: women, younger voters, men under age 50, those with annual household incomes above \$50,000, Democrats, independents, and those in all regions of the state except Northern Minnesota.
- Half of voters feel that the Special Counsel Robert Mueller-led investigation is fair; onethird feel it is biased.
 - A higher proportion of all groups feel that the investigation is "fair and impartial," except for older males, Republicans, and those who voted Trump in 2016.
 - Despite the preponderance of "fair and impartial" responses among most groups, sizable minorities of nearly all groups think that the investigation is "unfair and biased" or indicate that they are not sure whether the investigation is fair or biased.
- Half of voters believe the President should not be impeached and removed from office;
 over one-third feel he should be impeached and removed.
 - Among likely voters, a majority of the following groups believe that the President should *not* be impeached: Men, those above age 50, those residing in the Twin Cities suburban and exurban counties, those in the Northern half of the state, and both Republicans and those who voted for Trump in 2016.
 - Nearly all of those who believe the Mueller investigation is "unfair and biased against President Trump" think that Trump should *not* be impeached, and a majority who are unsure about the investigation's fairness also feel that Trump should *not* be impeached.
 - A majority of Democrats, those who voted for Clinton in the 2016 presidential election, and those who believe that the Mueller investigation is being conducted fairly think that President Trump should be impeached and removed from office. A plurality of younger voters (age 19 to 34) also feel this way.







Appendix 1: Survey background and methods

This survey is the result of a collaboration between Minnesota Public Radio News and the Star Tribune. It is a continuation of the Star Tribune's periodic "Minnesota Poll."²

Mason-Dixon Polling & Strategy, Inc. of Jacksonville, Florida, designed and executed the survey, including sample construction and screening procedures, data collection, and analysis. The poll was conducted from September 10 through September 12, 2018. A total of 800 registered Minnesota voters were interviewed statewide by telephone. All indicated they were likely to vote in the November general election.

Those interviewed were randomly selected from a phone-matched Minnesota voter registration list that included both land-line and cell phone numbers. Quotas were assigned to reflect voter turnout by county. The data were not weighted.

The margin for error, according to standards customarily used by statisticians, is no more than \pm 3.5 percentage points. This means that there is a 95 percent probability that the "true" figure would fall within that range if everyone in the target population were surveyed. The margin for error is higher for any subgroup, such as a sex or age grouping, as shown in Appendix 2.

The APM Research Lab provided consultation on the questionnaire and additional analysis of survey results, including this brief.
